NEW LIBRARY FACILITIES ACQUIRED FOR CASTLE High School

Automobile Driver Education and Training was not started at the beginning of this semester because funds had not been appropriated for the program. As soon as funds are appropriated by the State Legislature, plans for the state-wide program will be initiated. The outlook for the next school year indicates that the program will include classes for 10th graders on an out-of-school hour basis. Castle High School is slated to be equipped with two vehicles for driver training.

Castle High School has qualified for federal aid under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. This means that funds will be made available for the purchase of equipment and supplies to help our educational program. Qualification for this aid is based on the number of students currently receiving aid through the social services division. An expanded use of audio-visual aids and equipment by the teachers in classroom teaching is anticipated.

Many teachers have taken in-service training or are planning to enroll in university courses to improve their skills in various subjects. A recent workshop in audio-visual aids held at this school for teachers has created much interest in the making and use of audio-visual aids in classroom instruction.

Jobs Abroad for Students

At the end of the last school term, 600 students and teachers (ranging in age from 18 to 40) hopped from classrooms to Europe in practically one leap. None of them was particularly wealthy and none was on a special grant or scholarship. Yet each was able to afford a fabulous, meaningful, cultural summer abroad. They were participants in the JOBS ABROAD program originated by the International Student Information Service (ISIS).

ISIS and its American affiliate, the International Student Travel Center (ISTC), are non-profit organizations devoted to providing jobs to students and teachers who are sincerely interested in expanding their horizons by living and working abroad.

Most of their jobs are for unskilled workers in construction, on farms, in factories, hospitals, hotels and restaurants, as mother's helpers, and camp counselors. Salaries range from \$50 a month (including room and board) to \$200 a month. The salaries are the same as those paid to local employees doing the same job.

The student-worker has the unique advantage of getting a sharp, clear picture of a country and its culture for he sees it through the eyes of its people. Although participants are required to pay their own transportation cost when they join the JOBS ABROAD program, it is possible for an

The library has a new teacher's workroom where individual desks are provided. Special teacher periodicals, and other books are at their disposal. In addition to this, the school shop has just placed 14 study carrels (small, individual desks) for students' use.

A special survey was taken of our school library and listed below are some interesting statistics:

(1) This year the library has a \$10,000 book allotment.

(2) There are 4.5 books in the library, per student, far from the 7-10 books per enrolled student recommended.

(3) There are 569 filmstrips, and 101 long-playing records cataloged and filed for use of the teachers.
