

SOPHOMORE CLASS SPONSORS JANUARY MAGIC

HAWAII HEART ASSOCIATION OFFERS SCHOLARSHIP GRANT

The Hawaii Heart Association is offering a grant of \$500 to each of three high school students, who will be selected to undertake cardiovascular research for a 10-week period this summer, working alongside an experienced scientist who will act as supervisor and instructor.

The summer undergraduate research training program is being initiated this year in an effort to encourage gifted science students to consider careers in cardiovascular research.

Applicants for the Hawaii Heart Association research program must be either a junior or senior; and must have some familiarity with laboratory techniques chemical, biological or physiological. Preference in selection will be given to students with a grade average of "B" or higher, and who have shown an interest in the sciences.

Students interested in the grant should request an official application blank from Dr. George W. Henry, Chairman, Research Committee, Hawaii Heart Association, 1018 Lunalilo Street, Honolulu 96822.

The letter requesting the application blank should include the student's full name and address, name and school of the science teacher of teachers most familiar with the student's work, and the name and school of the sponsoring science teacher if different from the above.

The completed application blank, along with letters of recommendation from sponsoring teachers and a transcript of grades must be returned to the Hawaii Heart Association before March 1, 1966.

Students will be selected by the Research Committee on the basis of an evaluation of the student's application, his academic record and information provided by his sponsoring science teacher.

Applicants will be notified of selection by April 1, 1966.




They are constantly working on the preparations. Some of the many places that the Band is visiting are Japan, Guam, the Philippines, Hong Kong, and Taiwan.

Concerts are planned for the Band practically everyday of the trip.


