Discover Hawaii the Aloha way

Aloha Airlines asked the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington for permission to establish an Aloha Youth Plan fare which would entitle passengers between the ages of 12 and 22 to travel between the islands at half the adult fare, on a standby basis.

Under the arrangement, a young passenger to qualify for the reduced rate, would be required to purchase an Aloha Youth Card, good for one year, at a cost of \$3.00. To obtain the card the purchaser would be required to have a birth certificate, draft card, drivers license, passport, or other legal document verifying your age.

Aloha states that certain limitations would be imposed as to time of travel they are Friday before Labor Day and Labor Day weekend; Wednesday before and Sunday after Thanksgiving Day; December 23 through 26, and December 29 through January 3. Administration Hi-Lites

We are looking forward to the acquisition of educational equipment and supplies that will help our teachers to work more effectively. For the remaining months of this school year, the English Department will receive the bulk of the equipment since it is working on the continuous progress plan project. For the fiscal year beginning July 1, more equipment and supplies will be available for other departments. The additional funds needed to purchase these equipment and supplies are being furnished under Title I of the Education Act of 1965.

Much of the equipment will be audio-visual equipment such as over-head projectors. We will also acquire educational TV equipment which we hope to utilize as a closed circuit system for instructional purposes. Under Title I, we are also going to have the services of adult workers who will do clerical work in connection with classroom work and other programs. The new equipment and supplies and the classroom assistants employed under the new federal aid program will improve our school program.
